## Death of Ex-Governor William Haile of Keene, N. H.

Ex-Governor William Haile of Keene, one of the most distinguished citizens of New Hampshire, died of apoplexy at 6.30 Saturday morning. His health had been somewhat enfeebled for several years, but his sudden death will be a painful surprise to the community. Mr. Haile was born in Putney, Windham County, Vermont, May 22, 1807. His father was a farmer in bumble circumstances, but was a man of norightness and excellent character. Mr. Itaile was educated in the common schools and at Chestorfield Academy. He acted as salesman in a Chesterfield shop for four years and thea established himself as a tradesman. Eight years after he moved his shop to Hinsdale and began to trade in lumber; in 1849 he bought half of the Hinsdale woollen factory; five years ago he retired from business and moved to Keene. From 1828 to 1833 he was active in the State militia and was Captain of the Hinsdale Light Infantry, a well-known military organization of the olden times. He was a Representative in the Legislature from 1846 to 1851 and also in 1856, making seven years in all. As early as 1836 he was postmaster at Hinsdale. In 1850 he was a member of the Constitutional Convention, and in 1654 and 1855 he represented the Ninth District in the State Senate and was President of that body. The latter year Mr. Haile was the second Governor elected by the Republican party in New Hamp-bire. In March, 1857, Mr. Haile was elected Governor on the popular vote by the majority of nearly 3000. In 1858 he was re-elected to the Gubernatorial chair by a majority of over 4500 administration was distinguished votes. His purity. its dignity, integrity and effor ficiency. Governor Halle's courteous and unassuming manners, and his evident determination to do what was right, regardless of partisan prejudice, won him a multitude of firm friends in both of the great political parties. In 1860 he was a delegate at to the National Republican large Conven-Chicago, and delegate he was а tioñ at 10 1865 at large to Baltimore in 1861. him the Dartmouth Collego conferred upon honorary degree of Master of Arts. Governor Haile was a member of the Congregational Church, and was an active and prominent man in that denomination.
